























Public health and safety impacts - navigational hazards, injuries to recreational users and leaching of poisonous chemicals




























- UN Environment to provide assistance in the development of national and regional measures to address marine litter, acknowledging local, national and regional variations.
- ✓ UNEA Resolution UNEP/EA.3/L.20 in 2017 on "Marine Litter and Microplastics"
 - Regional Seas Conventions, within their mandates, support prevention and reduction of marine litter and microplastics.
- Nairobi Convention LBSA Protocol and COP Decision CP9/3 in 2019 on "Management of marine litter"
 - Implement the GPA within the context of the LBSA Protocol with support of UN Environment
 - To develop a regional strategy or action plan or both on the management of marine litter




WIO REGIONAL ACTION PLAN ON MARINE LITTER



Objectives:



- ✓ Support implementation of LBSA Protocol monitor quantities and distribution, establish regional mechanism to address marine litter and microplastics
- ✓ Support achievement of SDG 14.1 prevent and reduce marine pollution, particularly from LBSA, including marine debris





WIO REGIONAL ACTION PLAN - ACTIONS AND INTERVENTIONS



















- Establish a regional forum to coordinate stakeholder participation in marine litter management
- Improve port reception facilities to effectively manage ship-generated waste
- Eliminate, change or adapt products for environmental benefits
- Identify probable 'hotspots' of land- and sea-based sources for plastic and microplastics
- 5. Design standard methodologies for studying, monitoring and reporting on marine litter and microplastics for the region
- 6. Promote the 4 Rs (Reducing, Reusing Recycling, Recovering)
- Promote awareness on the impacts of marine litter through education, training and knowledge exchange
- Establish a database and information sharing mechanism on effective strategies and practices for waste management

Membership to the Group of Experts on Marine Litters and Microplastics: Call for expression of interest

The Group will promote sharing and exchange of information; providing policy guidance and advice to the Nairobi Convention and other regional frameworks; and synthesizing information on the topic from different sources and produce peer-reviewed publications and other products



TORS OF THE MLMP TWG







• Enhance understanding of marine litter and microplastics among formal and informal stakeholders, including governments, management authorities, private sector, communities and encourage dialogue between them.



 Assess the current status of marine litter and microplastics knowledge in the WIO region



 Assess the policy landscape and institutional frameworks on marine litter in different countries



• Published status reports on marine litter in peer-reviewed journals























- Review the recently developed Regional Marine Litter Action Plan and through this instrument, facilitate the development of a coherent regional vision and strategy for work on marine litter and microplastics within the context of the Nairobi Convention
- Identify institutional capacity needs and possible capacity development
- Advise on the development of regional Guidelines, Best Practices, Standards and Procedures for marine litter and microplastics management.

- Provide guidance on the development and implementation of regional marine litter and a microplastics monitoring programme.
- Provide state-of-the-art science to support policy developments on marine litter and microplastics in the region through the Science to Policy Platform of the Convention
- Offer technical support in the development and review of concepts/proposals in relation to marine litter and microplastics on behalf of Nairobi Convention and WIOMSA in respect to the implementation of the Regional Marine Litter Action Plan.
- •Undertake quality assurance of outputs related to marine litter and microplastics produced through the support of both Nairobi Convention and WIOMSA.















MODUS OPERANDI

- The Group of Experts for Marine Litter and Microplastics is established by the Nairobi Convention vide 'Decision CP.9/3. Management of marine litter and municipal wastewater in the Western Indian Ocean'
- TWG will be hosted by WIOMSA close partnership.
- The core membership of the Group will comprise of experts whose selection was based on the strong regional knowledge and experience in marine litter and microplastics
- The Group will invite, consult and involve on the basis of issues representatives of partner organizations and individual experts as well.
- Since the Group will be operating under the Nairobi Convention, it will be reporting directly to the Focal Points of the Nairobi Convention as well as the relevant Regional Task Forces established under WIOSAP Project.
- Experts will get formal nomination letters from the Nairobi Convention after this **PSC** meeting



















PROCESS OF ESTABLISHMENT

- ✓ With WIOMSA develop TORs for the Group
- ✓ Open Call for expressions of interest by regional experts.
- √ 30 applications received and we established a criteria for evaluation, which included technical criteria, regional balance and gender
- √ 9 experts selected and already communicated to
- ✓ 1st meeting of the Group in Capetown in June 13th to 14th June TORs and priority actions



RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

















- ➤ Undertake a regional assessment on the status of marine litter and microplastics knowledge including policy and institutional frameworks
- ➤ Comment on the draft Regional Marine Litter Action Plan before the July 2019 meeting of the Working Group
- ➤ Review the WIOMSA Marine Litter Monitoring Manual and evolve as necessary given local capacity available following the first round of accumulation studies
- Explore the possibility of supporting the development of a GEF project on marine litter and microplastics for the region
