3. Bahari Mali (Sustainable Blue Livelihoods in the Tanga-Pemba Seascape), Tanzania



- Improved livelihood and socio-economic status of coastal communities particularly women and youth
- Improved management of marine and coastal ecosystems in the Tanga-Pemba Seascape
- Increased knowledge and awareness among key stakeholders in Tanga-Pemba Seascape and the Western Indian Ocean region
- Enhanced advocacy for effective conservation of ecosystems and coastal and marine resources in the Tanga-Pemba seascape

4. Strengthening the contribution of seagrass beds to socio-ecological resilience and development



- Strengthen governance frameworks at national and local levels to promote active participation of local stakeholders in the management of seagrass beds
- Strengthen knowledge on seagrass beds and facilitate the exchange of information and experiences between stakeholders
- Support implementation of on ground actions that contribute to conservation and restoration and strengthen socio-ecological resilience of communities
- Promote to public and private actors the preservation of natural capital within the framework of the development of a blue economy
